Positive Case Notifications



Over the past fortnight families will have received, via the See Saw platform, notifications of positive COVID-19 cases who have attended onsite. Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs)



All staff and students onsite should now have received an additional two weeks supply of RATs during the last week, which should take us up to Friday March 11. For families in specialist settings it is recommended that they test their children at home each morning before coming to school, five days per week.

By direction of the Deputy Secretary of DET, "under no circumstance is a member of staff to conduct or assist to conduct a RAT on a student."

Please remember that this process is voluntary for staff and students.
