

Multi-Sensory Therapy Report—Jo Robinson

We have had a wonderful start to the year in the Multi Sensory Environment Room or Magic Room as it is affectionately known. The Magic Room is located in S4 between the Art Room and the Engine Room, which provides opportunities to practice transitions from classrooms to the Magic Room through the courtyard. Thank you to parents and carers for your quick completion and return of the permission forms to participate in the Multi Sensory Therapy program. Individual aromatherapy massage creams have been created to cater for each students unique needs. These individualised hand made creams are used in Multi Therapy sessions and are also available for use in the classroom as required and desired.

It has been fantastic to welcome students back to the Magic Room to begin to explore our interactive and inclusive technologies. The Bubble Columns which slowly change colour and rise from the bottom to the top of the Columns and can be turned on and off using a wireless switch. The Magic Carpet projection system is an app based interactive projection system that stimulates and engages people of all ages and abilities. Students simply move part or all of their body over the projected apps to interact with—they can even roll a ball or wave a ribbon. It has a motion capture camera that tracks users as they move over the projected apps. This movement data informs the software of the speed, direction and location of the movement. The software then converts this data into dynamic audio visual feedback which students will experience as real time cause and effect triggered by their movement.

I look forward to a sensational year ahead, welcoming new students to the program Isaac, Kate and Ellie. This year the Multi Sensory Therapy program will run on a Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.
