Occupational Therapy Report—Emily Challis

All Things Chewing!

Intro:

The oral sensory system is one of the crucial systems of our physiology. This system does not just help us with the sensation of taste but also, acts as an important feedback mechanism for our oral motor input.

When this system works efficiently, children can eat a variety of foods with different flavours and textures. They can also participate in oral hygiene routines without any difficulties and are able to self-regulate and concentrate, without seeking the help of additional oral motor input or chewing.

However, this is not the case for every child because they cannot process all the oral information efficiently and as a result, they need some help in this department. Oral sensory seeking is the function that children resort to when they continue chewing on things or putting things in their mouth when they are well past the age of 2 years.

Chewies:

Chewy tools provide an effective way to increase children's oral sensory buckets! They are usually hospital grade silicone for hygiene purposes. Occupational therapists use/recommend chewies to provide calming, organising, tactile and deep pressure proprioceptive input in special education classrooms, therapy settings, or for home use. Chewies are great for providing oral sensory stimulation for sensory seekers who grind their teeth, bite, or chew on their clothing, hair, and pencils. Chewies are often provided alongside other sensory strategies (please see below). Sensory and oral motor needs are constantly evolving and require constant review.

Each type of chewy provides different sensory inputs. For example, a chewy which is textured provides more proprioceptive input, whereas a smooth chewy is more commonly prescribed for mild chewing, individuals with low oral tone, or individuals with limited jaw strength just learning to bite and chew.

Common chewies:







Grabber (textured & smooth)



Tough Bars



Tubing

Reasons a child might need a chewy:

- Mouthing non-food objects
- Biting/chewing non food objects
- Playing with water/saliva in mouth
- Over filling mouth when eating
- ♦ Grinding teeth
- Biting self/others/objects
- Shows strong preference for certain foods

Things to try alongside a chewy:

- Increasing crunchy foods throughout the day (crackers, popcorn, carrot and cucumber sticks, apple, dry cereal, pretzels)
- ♦ Encourage child to drink through a straw
- ♦ Blow pom poms along a table with a straw
- ♦ Kazoo
- Blowing bubbles
- ♦ Frozen grapes (cut in half)
- Crunch on ice in the warmer months
