Principal's Report

Welcome Back for Term 2



Welcome back to all of our families for a terrific term 2. It is always so rewarding to see the students beaming faces during the first week back at school and it reminds us why we have chosen this for a vocation.

Building Program





This means that our specialist programs will be able to continue until at least end of term 2 and part of term 3 at this stage.

42 teachers, education support staff and parents came to Bayside SDS last Saturday for a day of Intensive Interaction training. Introduction to CORE Word Vocabulary



Communication is a very important focus of the curriculum at Bayside SDS and staff are trained in using a variety of Augmentative and Alternative means of communication (AAC) to enhance language and communication development.

"Core vocabulary is a list of words that have been determined to be highly useful for communicating in both social and academic contexts. A core vocabulary is comprised of the words that are used most commonly in the expressive communication, including verbs, determiners, adjectives and prepositions - (Yorkston, et al., 1988)"

Core words have been described as the "building blocks of language" that add meaning to what we are saying,

Did you know?

70-80% of what we say is communicated with only 200 basic core words!

By giving AAC learners quick access to these core words, we're providing them with a powerful tool to communicate whatever they want to say.

To enhance staff and student skills further, in term 2, I will be introducing a Core word of the week program. The aim of this program is:

- Whole school approach to enhance and build on students language and communication
- Consolidate staff and students skills on navigating their various paper based and electronic communication devices
- Encourage language modelling using various communication strategies
- Build on student reasons to communicate Expressing needs and wants, getting and giving information, social interactions and strategies to be better understood (please see handout provided for further information).

It has been nice to see all classroom staff involving themselves with each student uninterrupted via reading or play. One of the features of visiting the school library, as an imitation of a community space, is utilising students own, or school supplied augmented methods of communication. You may see in some of our photos, students using a big mac switch to request borrowing, pointing at or receptively following a teacher pointing at a chat board to comment about play time or a book, and using their own iPads communication platform to request or comment.


