### Principal's /Assistant Principal's Report

This final term of the school year is often the busiest, packed with assessments and reporting, preparations for end-of-year events and our school review. With so much going on, the weeks tend to pass by in a blur, and before we know it, the school year will be over. While it can be challenging, it's also an exciting time as we wrap up the year and reflect on all that's been accomplished. We are most looking forward to celebrating with our graduating students.

### **Bayside SDS Parents and Carers**

We all recognise that COVID significantly impacted many aspects of our lives, including our engagement with school communities. For this reason we are looking to reestablish family engagement—something that Bayside had previously done so well.



Our Bayside SDS Parents and Carers group aims to promote community engagement and provide a forum for peer support. The plan is to achieve this through activities such as:

- Regular coffee catchups
- Termly family events (play centres, park catchups, school-based events), and
- Parent learning/resources/engagement events guest speakers/sharing a focus (for example, post school options).

### Hydro

As you know, we have faced a number of challenges with our hydro pool ever since the construction of the new school. This year, the heater was replaced, and a leak was found and repaired. Our latest challenge has been finding appropriate staff to meet the regulatory requirements. A main goal here is to support students that require hydrotherapy as apposed to land based exercises, through Physiotherapy.

It is disappointing that we are not presently able to use the hydro facility to benefit our students, but we hope to have positive news shortly.

### Farewell

This week we said farewell to Physiotherapist Brigid McNamara, who has been working with us through Noah's Ark. Brigid has been a fantastic asset to the school, so we were sad to learn that she had accepted an opportunity to move to Japan for 12 months to provide services for holidaymakers at an island resort (although we are obviously excited for her and the amazing opportunity). We would certainly love to see Brigid back at Bayside after her adventures.

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### **New 15-Minute Parking**

Kingston Council has provided us with a new 15-bay parking area available between 8AM and 4PM. This was requested to support families during drop-offs and pick-ups throughout the school day. The location of the parking area (to the east of the front entrance) was chosen to avoid the need for reverse parking. We appreciate Kingston Council's quick response.



### **Sun Smart**

We ask that students have SPF50+ applied before school as we approach Summer and UV levels increase. Staff will support further applications during the school day, and encourage students to access shaded areas where appropriate. Please also provide a suitable hat for sun protection. Staff will encourage students wear these when outside.

Thank you to those that were able to complete the Parent google survey. It was great to be able to ask some questions that are more specific to our school and receive some feedback about the work we do. We will definitely look to do similar again next year to supplement the department's survey.

### Multi Sensory Therapy—Juniors

The juniors all enjoy interacting with various apps projected through the Magic Carpet and using a big red switch to turn the Bubbles in the Bubble Columns on and off.

I thought you would like to see some of the other sensory items students enjoy.

The star carpet is a soft black carpet with tiny little lights which turn on and illuminate the carpet like stars in the dark sky, students have liked touching the carpet and looking at the twinkling star lights often utilising their motor skills to touch the individual tiny lights.

The Infinity Disk is a portable visually intriguing item which has a spiral of coloured lights creating the illusion of a tunnel of lights which lead to end point when you look at it.

Meeting our new AI responsive robotic dog Meta Dog has also been a highlight. Students have liked patting him and feeling his soft fur—his ears and paws particularly popular. His silicone tongue and paw pads have also created a lot of interest. However, when he barks and makes different sounds and moves his head, wags his tail and his eyes move the smiles, engagement and interaction are wonderful to experience!
