


Wh- questions are a key part of language development for children. It is important that children ask and answer Wh- questions, as they lay the groundwork for children to participate in conversations, demonstrate knowledge, **What is a WH Question?**

Wh- questions are questions people ask to get information or communicate their wants and needs. These could be about anything. We use them every day at home, at work, and in the classroom and we use them frequently.

Here are the wh- questions:

- What is for asking about something (what is that?)
- When is for asking about a time (when do you brush your teeth?)
- Where is for asking about a place (where are you coming from?)
- Why is for asking about a reason (why are you running?)
- Who is for asking about a person (who is at school today?)
- How is for asking about the condition, manner, or quality of something (how do you draw?)



Why "WH" Questions

Wh- questions are an essential part of everyday life and their importance goes far beyond speech development. Learning to ask and answer wh- questions helps children:

- Build conversation skills
- Boost social skills and build relationships
- Stimulate vocabulary development
- Demonstrate an understanding of new information
- Promote reasoning, critical thinking and problem solving skills
- Learn how to follow directions
- Relay information to others



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Speech Pathology Report—Em Mizzi

Usually, children start to learn wh- questions starting with more concrete questions, about their environment. They ask and master the "what" question earliest. Then "who" and "where" follow. Generally, due to its less concrete nature, the last question to be mastered is "why".

How to help your child learn to ask and answer "wh" questions.

- 1. **Visual Cues**: When asking questions, show photographs, illustrations, or actual objects that correlate to the question. Many children require visual support to full process information. Visual images help transform abstract concepts into concrete concepts. A visual representation provides a constant reminder of the type of question asked.
- 2. **Give Choices**: If your child is displaying difficulties answering open ended whquestions, start off with multiple choices. This strategy will not only increase understanding, but will increase a child's confidence, as he/she is more likely to answer accurately.
 - For example, if you are asking a child, "where does a cow live?", give multiple choices ("ocean" or "farm"). Since both options are places, it reinforces the idea that the child must answer "where" questions with the name of a place.
- 3. Help with "why" questions: Answering "why" questions are more difficult, as these answers are not concrete and require inferential thinking. The good news is that we teach how to answer these questions in the same way that we teach how to answer other wh- questions: through visual cues, repetition, and multiple examples.

This term the senior students in W1 at Bayside SDS have been working on asking and answering "wh" questions. The goal has been to develop vocabulary, language and to build social skills.

Within the classroom, we have participated in teaching and learning through social stories, role plays, board games, interviewing our friends and creating "books about me".

The seniors, using a multimodal approach to communication have participate in asking each other questions, with speech, Key Word Sign, picture-based visuals, and Electronic Communication Systems.

They have also been building on their social skills, finding out about their friends likes and dislikes, what they did on the weekends, and their home life.

We then extended this interview scenario to students interviewing staff around the school. This was a great experience for the students who very confidently asked "wh" questions and recorded answers.
