With the holidays quickly approaching, I thought I would share a fun sensory tub which is easy to make, easy to adapt for different abilities and all you need is a tub and dried rice, dried pulses such as beans or dried pasta-bows are quite festive or a combination of sizes and textures for even more sensory exploration.

Turn the dried ingredients green (or your chosen colour) by adding a few drops of green food colouring and combine. Then add an assortment of Christmas decorations or objects related to your theme of choice which you think may be appealing to your child.

Ensure the objects are larger than mouth size if they may be explored by mouth and always supervise and share the fun of the exploration!

For a festive themed sensory tub - pom poms, wooden stars, large baubles, tinsel, bells are some ideas of objects you may already have at home.

### **Occupational Therapy Christmas Craft!**



Here's a wonderfully easy, beautifully scented gingerbread play dough recipe that takes just minutes to make, makes the house smell so much like Christmas and is a great fine motor activity!

#### Ingredients:

- 2 cups of flour
- 1 cup of salt
- tsp cinnamon
- tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp allspice
- 1 cup of warm water
- 5 drops of glycerine for extra shine!
- **Gingerbread Man Cookie Cutter**

#### Method:

Mix all the dry ingredients into a bowl. Add the oil. Stir in the boiling water and allow to cool briefly. Knead it into a workable dough on a floured surface using your hands. After a few minutes it should be soft and smooth, and none should come off on your fingers. If it's still a little sticky then add more flour, one tablespoon at a time until it's just right! Finally, add the glycerine for that extra smooth softness and shine.

- sensory: explore malleable materials using hands, discuss smells and what they make us think of;

It's nearly Christmas and what a better way to celebrate with your child than engaging in an art activity together.

Please find instructions on how to create a personalised snow dome. Also included is an Aided Language Display (ALD).


This ALD contains the vocabulary in this activity represented by picture symbols. As you complete the art activity, point to each vocabulary as you say it. For example, "I want to pour water". This helps your child learn new vocabulary/ picture symbols and construct longer and more detailed phrases and sentences and enhances communication overall.

We create ALDs for almost every activity we engage in at Bayside SDS to help students participate in fun and engaging activities, all while encouraging and modelling language and communication.

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- Cut out photos of students and leave a flap of laminate at the bottom (to bend and stick to jar lid in later step)
- 2. Fill jug with water
- 3. Choose Christmas ornament
- 4. Fold flap at bottom of picture and hot glue onto lid so it is standing up
- 5. Hot glue Christmas ornament to lid
- 6. Choose coloured glitter
- 7. Pour glitter into empty jar
- 8. Fill jar with water
- 9. Apply hot glue to lid rim
- 10. Screw on lid tightly and let dry
- 11. Finished and enjoy
